GRAND PERFORMANCE OF "THE CREATION."

Never before has Haydn's bright and ever-popular oratorio been performed so magnificently in Dover as by the Dover Choral Union at the Town Hall, on Wednesday evening, 2nd December. Ten years have elapsed since the splendid work was previously produced in Dover, and those amongst Wednesday's audience who attended that performance were loudest in their praises of the local Choral Society and their talented Conductor. Not a single front

seat was vacant, in fact, the Hall was comfortably filled when. at eight o'clock, the programme opened. Many favourite numbers are included in this oratorio, and as principal soloists the services of such accomplished artistes as Miss Alys Bateman (soprano), Mr. Henry Turnpenney (tenor), and Mr. A. Walenn (baritone), had been engaged. Upwards of 150 performers constituted the band and chorus, the whole being under the able direction of Mr. H. J. Taylor, F.R.C.O. as conductor, with Mr. E. W. Barclay (principal violin), and Mr. F. E. Fletcher, Mus. Bac., F.R.C.O., (organist). Beyond question the Choral Union excelled all previous records on this occasion, their rendition of such
